Comments From Audience

COMMENTS FROM AUDIENCE

Minutes:

Mr. Eddie Diamond stated that citizens need to call their legislators and ask for support of funding that we desperately need in Duval County. Mr. Diamond is working on transforming students who have bad behavior to good behavior.

Ms. Jennifer Snead, president, Duval Arts Teachers Association requested the Board's support for funding for the arts and urged them to not cut any programs.

Mr. Ferdinand JuLuke, Jr., representing the NAACP Education Committee, supports Project Safe Schools except for 2.01 which is used as a "catch all", especially for African American students. Mr. JuLuke will participate in monitoring this program along with the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office. Invited the Board to attend a meeting to be held on April 18, 2008 with the NAACP which will include this program.

Mr. John Turner spoke about five points - overcrowding; greedy developers need to pay for new schools who are backing School Board members who are willing to sell out; the Interlocal Agreement is not working and lets the developers off the hook and the School Board voted for it. they don't have to pay impact fees and the school district will have to redraw boundaries and bus students. The local media has not reported this.

Mr. Edward Exson wrote, "Who could have imagined that the state of Florida would have apologized for slavery before this board would change the name of Nathan Bedford Forest High School? Change the name and stop pussyfooting around! We readily think of "upside down" as in the housing market and people's credit dilemmas, however, in education, it is far more significant. Consider some football coaches are the highest paid state employees, such, is truly upside down. While good educators salaries which teach students how to think for a life time, is tantamount to minimum wages in comparison. Students coming from good professors become healers, good teachers, scientists, builders, developers, farmers and the list goes on preparing people to make great contributions to society. While coach's find, foster and nurture, not necessarily good students, but one's with athleticism, trained brute-like and to become entertainers plus other adjectives, while many leaving school unable to read. William C. rhoden in his book he calls them "For Million Dollar Slaves", "The Rise, Fall and Redemption of the Black", albeit, he clearly points out the vast contributions that may, yet few, have made in all aspects of society. More grimly, since the of Dr. King forty

years ago, many African Americans have attended and graduated from the Jacksonville Leadership. Upon graduation, many walk around clutching a book on leadership, while auditioning dancing the gig, trying to prove the benefactors (their masters) that they would make the better servant and will maintain for them the status quo. The African American representation on this Board and staff, along with the City Council members, the JTA Chairman, members on the JEA, JAA and Port Authority, Boards and other appointed high ranking positions, Civil Rights Groups with churches on every corner. Yet, the minority community is in the predicament we're in, suffocating and dying, while pretending we're all that - <u>that's profoundly stupid upside down</u>, and traveling like the ant lion backwards. Former Mayor Delaney once called black neighborhoods "intensive care neighborhoods", therefore, our leadership is less effective than a placebo. On e has to ask where Jesus is...what a sad memorial to Dr. King! Thank you.

Mr. Robert A. White spoke in support of funding for the arts. All great civilizations use art to show what they are all about.

Mr. Matthew Cawley spoke in support of the arts and school dance for FCAT. Mr. Cawley said he taught a song to the students earlier in the school year. The students all danced and sang along with the song and music.

Ms. Jane Condon spoke in support of the arts and she understands about the budget issues; she urged the Board to keep the programs ongoing. The students who have art education excel in other areas of their education which increases enrollment in college. Ms. Condon will send remarks to the Board at a later date.

Mr. Seth Lalmansingh teaches high school in town spoke about the Strategic Plan, Section A - Initiatives and Actions. This sections talks about digital communications - initiating plan for communications between teachers and parents; supports academic excellence for all students; good for parents and teachers to know each other and to keep everyone on the same page; small learning community; needs the district to provide source or database for all parent contact information and training for those who do not have computers.

Mr. Matt Campese, a high school math teacher, spoke about the Strategic Plan - Goal 1; thank you for setting the framework for goals; Read 180 for Levels 1 and 2 - would like to see something for math for Levels 1 and 2; second part, 1B - increase student success. Algebra 1 is not a Springboard course; suggests stronger emphasis on vertical alignment to work on math program.

Mr. John King spoke on behalf of Level 1 and 2 students regarding the Strategic Plan, a high school math teacher, suggested that we offer an option to Algebra 1. If we don't offer a substitution, we will lose more students. Algebra II requirements will make us lose a lot of students and set them up to fail.

Ms. Amber Amerson spoke in support of the arts and asked that cuts be made across the Board and not just in the arts.

Ms. Debra Jahns-Nelsen spoke about Project Safe Schools; sits on the Jacksonville Journey Education Subcommittee relating to safe schools; hard time relating possession of tobacco and wireless devices being grouped in with vandalism and extortion. Ms. Jahns-Nelsen added concern about prequalification of contractors and the recent audit report - only one plumbing, electrical, and HVAC contractor for the year not competitive and needs more pre-certified contractors; audit committee - no future meetings scheduled, to date.

Mr. Jim Stamps said his daughter attends Douglas Anderson School for the Arts and plays the piano; urged the Board to support arts funding; spoke about David Letterman and toll booths.

Ms. Julie Delegal spoke in support of the arts and about "Showcase on the River" - an invitation will be forthcoming. When talking with legislators, we must direct comments to them that education is core and should not be cut.

Ms. Eunice Barnum mentioned Governor Charlie Crist being in Jacksonville last week as a running mate for Vice President instead of as a Governor. We need to pass an executive order to send all of you home and give money to parents to buy their children's education. The data backs me up. I have a child at Ribault who is failing; four children at Lee failed and a grandchild was kicked out of LaVilla. I am sick of these children being mistreated and need relief. The Governor needs to come here and address these problems.

Ms. Sheila Andrews requested to volunteer at Ribault High School as a parent liaison; not good enough to sit on the Community Assessment Team; gave report on April 7, 2008 at 10:00 am in front of this building regarding students with reading problems attending Ribault High School. There are approximately 200 students out of 700 who are not receiving services. Students are skipping school and parents are not offering any relief.

PTA - Pam Kinevan, President:

On March 26th and 27th, PTA members traveled to Tallahassee to discuss adequate funding of education and other education issues with our legislators. Again this month, many of our members are working to prepare for the next opening of the Teacher Supply Depot that will be April 17th from 3 – 6p.m. We encourage all teachers and principals to take advantage of all the Teacher Supply Depot has to offer.

PTAs should now be preparing to join the celebration in recognizing their PTA members and volunteers at the May 6th Jacksonville Sun's Game. Student Achievement, Reform Activities, And Reports

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Minutes:

Superintendent Ed Pratt-Dannals gave a report addressing comments on the Arts program, stating that everyone supports the arts. This is a challenging year on funding and spoke about the efforts made in Tallahassee, asking for relief on the Class Size Amendment; allowing districts to use the 1/4 mill on Capital dollars used as Operating dollars; asked about looking at School Recognition funds for use in other areas; spoke about the Strategic Plan progress which will be brought to the May or June Board meeting for a vote and commended Doug Ayars and his staff for work on ACE.

<u>Budget:</u> Efforts at state level from the House and Senate to cushion blow of shortfall; different versions - may not know until near end of the session at the end of April. Will look like less of a cut than it actually is because of moving categorical dollars to BSA. Positive regarding using .20 or more of capital for operation. Extensive lobbying by FSBA (members of our Board), FADSS (me), teachers (including DTU), and PTSA; continue to work with Board to made good decisions.

Attendance: 18 year old attendance regulation - looks like it may pass with 2008-09 as a planning year.

<u>Strategic Plan</u>: moving forward; encourage all to review on the website - <u>www.duvalschools.org</u> and provide feedback. Over 600 responses so far - many are thoughtful.

ACE: Mr. Ayars will give a report on this.

FCAT: Visiting schools prior to and during FCAT - upbeat and confident.

Planning: Begin planning for next year.

Reports

1. OPERATIONS - MR. DOUG AYARS

Minutes:

Mr. Doug Ayars, Chief Operating Officer, spoke about the groundbreaking of AAA high school and gave ACE updates - Round 1 of meetings; preparation for the 2008-2009 school year opening; prequalifications for contractors; comments made regarding the Interlocal Agreement; City of Jacksonville (coj.net) website; long term effects - make the public aware and walk them through the process.

2. SCHOOL HEALTH ADVISORY COUNCIL - DR. KAREN TOKER

Minutes:

It has been one year since we last reported to the School Board on the activities of the School Health Advisory Council. Last year, we gave the Board a brief historical overview of the purpose and activities of the SHAC since its inception in 1973, when the Florida Legislature mandated such a committee/council in the Florida School Health Services Act (FS 381.0056). The mandate through this act was for each county to have an advisory group composed primarily of the school, health, and community representatives who act collectively to advise the school district on aspects of child health. The scope of the SHAC was defined more explicitly in July, 2006, when the legislature stated that each SHAC must include members who represent the eight components of the Coordinated School Health Model as defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). These eight ares include:

- 1. Comprehensive School Health Education
- 2. Physical Education
- 3. School Health Services (including School Nursing Services)
- 4. School Nutrition Services
- 5. School Counseling, Psychological, and Social Services
- 6. Healthy School Environment
- 7. School-Site Health Promotion for Staff
- 8. Family and Community Involvement in School Health

Last year, we also spoke about the Community Forum held by the SHAC in January, 2006, where four priority areas of need were identified for the SHAC to investigate and try to impact. the priority areas were:

- 1. Increasing the number of school nurses in DCPS
- 2. Increasing the number of school guidance counselors in schools
- 3. Increasing parental involvement in schools

4. Promoting physical education (at least 30 minutes daily), improve nutrition and nutrition education programs in our schools from pre-KK through grade 12.

We, then developed four committees to deal with these four issues. Our Student Services Committee took on the first two priorities, but has spent the entire past two years working on Issue #1, that of increasing the number of school nurses in DCPS. During this time, members of our committee have:

* Partnered with UNF and the Commission on Services for Children with Special Needs to complete *the Northeast Florida School Nurse Study- 2006, Survey Results of School Nurses in 5 Counties*, which studied the role of the school nurse in five counties including Duval County. Key findings were:

* Florida ranks 43rd amount the states with 1 nurse to 2,159 students;

* Duval County ranks behind Florida with a ration of 1 nurse to 2,964 students;

* DOH school nurses covering regular schools have 1 nurse to 3,722 students;

* National standards recommend 1 nurse per 750 students in regular schools;

* Increased burden of chronic illness in school children compared to the past including increased asthma and diabetes;

* Too few nurses to adequately take care of health needs of our children. they have too many students and too many schools;

* Nurses covering only 1 school are more available to plan health care and consult with providers;

* Many different people give medications when nurses or health aides are not available thus creating a riskmanagement issue;

* Nurses work "silently" often with very little recognition and are not always seen as professionals in the same way as educational colleagues.

- * Conducted a Survey of DCPS School Principals
 - * Elementary schools want a full time nurse on campus daily;
 - * School personnel are worried about non-medical personnel doing medical procedures;
 - * School personnel are worried about potential legal liability related to student medical services

* Reviewed the DOH School Health Services Plan, a quality improvement plan done every two years and required by the State.

* Developed a School Health Satisfaction Survey of teachers, parents and students to be conducted April, 2008.

Our Parent/Community Committee has taken on priority #3 of increasing parental involvement in health activities, both at home and at school, and have:

* Encouraged families to participate in community events, i.e. "walk to school/ride your bike day" and "television shutoff day" which are sponsored by the Duval county Health Department and Duval County Parks and Recreation;

- * Submitted health articles to the district wide PTA council regarding student health issues;
- * Begun planning a district wide health fair for parents, students and DCPS personnel.

Our Nutrition and Physical Education Committee has taken on priority #4 and have:

* Partnered with the Healthy Jacksonville Obesity Coalition to develop strategies to address the epidemic of childhood obesity in the school environment;

* Partnered with the DCPS Wellness Committee and Aramark to make changes to the school breakfast and lunch program to make them more nutritious;

* Partnered with the DCPS Wellness Committee to formulate and monitor the Wellness Policy;

Advocated for more physical activity and physical education in the school day;

* Expanded the membership of the SHAC to include at least one physical education teacher;

* Contributed to a variety of district-wide workshops and professional development opportunities for Health Education and Physical Education teachers;

* Participated in local meetings and school site visits of the Governor's Council on Physical Fitness;

* Supported the implementation of the new 150-minutes per week of required physical education at the elementary school level and the new integrated course (H.O.P.E.) at the high school level in response to recent legislation;

* Stayed abreast of the Sunshine State Standards for Health Education and Physical Education revision process.

Our Health Education/Curriculum Committee continues to review programs which various groups would like to show in the schools:

* The committee has reviewed 15 programs during the past year;

* The Health Education/Curriculum Committee of the SHAC would like to make known its concern about the way that many Health classes are being implemented. the fact that some teachers have as many as 50-70 students in a class and are traveling with resources such as a video, CPR manikins, and AED defibrillator's makes it difficult for them to be as effective as they could be with a more appropriate number of students and a more stable working situation. Health teachers are felling devalued.

HOW CAN THE SCHOOL BOARD HELP US?:

1. Firstly, we want to thank Ms. Kris Barnes for accepting our invitation to join the SHAC. We need School Board participation on the SHAC so that we can fully communicate the health program needs of the school systems nd their potential solutions to the Board. Healthy children are better able to learn and become productive citizens.

2. The Board needs to become more aware of changes in health issues that are affecting the DCPS,. We are asking the School Board to consider having a workshop on School Health in fiscal year 2009.

3. The SHAC and District Wellness Committee represent ideal venues to affect change within the school system. They bring together parents, educators, administrators, school nutrition services, health care expects, and community groups interested in the health of our children. The SHAC and District Wellness Committee need the resources to investigate, study and make recommendations to the school system to achieve health goals and affect positive change.

4. School-based physical activity and nutrition guildelines need strengthening to meet current standards.

5. Reconsider how health classes are being implemented.
