# Comments From Audience

## COMMENTS FROM AUDIENCE

#### Minutes:

Mr. Trey Csar said I'm representing the Jacksonville Public Education Fund and I'd like to echo the praises on the district staff - teachers and students - for all of the tremendous effort reflected in the school grades that were released last week. Despite changing and more difficult standards, some of Duval County's most challenged schools made incredible progress. Although statewide, elementary school grades were expected to drop, five of Duval County's most economically challenged schools gained a letter grade. On behalf of JPEF staff and Board, I want to commend you for your leadership on this and for all of our teachers and students who worked so very hard on this test. As all of you know, the primary election for four of our School Board seats is August 14 and the JPEF is working with the Coalition of Organizations to help promote voter education and turn out during this election. That Coalition includes organizations like Save Duval Schools, the Jacksonville Kids Coalition, Duval County Council of PTAs, the Urban League and WJCT. These partner organizations have developed a website where we posted responses from candidates to a questionnaire that was jointly developed. That website is: Schoolboard 2012.org. We encourage you to check it out and see what the candidates are willing to bring to this Board should they be elected. Additionally, we are hosting four (4) candidate forums; one in each of the four districts. Those begin tomorrow (July 24) night in District 7 at Atlantic Coast High School at 6:00 pm; District 1 forum at Terry Parker High School on Thursday, July 26 at 6:00 pm; District 5 at Raines High School, July 31 at 6:00 pm; and District 3 at Englewood High School at Englewood High School at 6:00 pm. We invite everyone to come out to the forums to make sure everyone is fully informed when they enter the polls on August 14th. We know it's been a very busy summer for all of you as well as for us and I want to thank you for everything you do for the kids in our county and I look forward to a great school year working with you this coming year. Thank you.

Mr. John Turner said tonight you will divide up over one million dollars to several nonprofit groups in hopes that their programs will save at-risk students from dropping out of high school. Although I commend you for wanting to do something about our drop out rate, I still must insist that as a "watch dog" against waste fraud and abuse that you provide the proof that the programs really work and they are worth the expense. Tonight, you're going to divert \$400,000 to Communities in Schools. CIS claims to be the largest drop out prevention organization in Jacksonville. That may be true but being the largest does not mean the best. How do we know if the program is any better than Big Brothers and Big Sisters of America? When was the last time you conducted an audit to verify their claims of success? CIS was required to submit a comprehensive annual performance report to the School Board no later than last Thursday, July 12; however, I can't find anyone in this room that knows of such a report being filed. Perhaps, the report finally showed up during the workshop but I can't speak to that. What I found out about is through a Google search. There's a website called CharityNavigator org which is a highly respected organization for rating non-profit groups also known as 501(c)(3). According to this site, CIS failed to get the highest rate of four stars due to accountability and transparency discrepancies. CIS failed to list the salary of their CEO for their IRS 9-90 form; failed to have an Audit Oversight Committee; they pay members on their Board of Directors; although Board members being compensated is not illegal, it can call into question a non-profit's financial integrity. The most troubling of all that I found was a former employee of CIS gave a review and gave it the lowest rating. They said that CIS does not properly monitor mentoring relationships. Obviously, this ex-volunteer is worried about possible child abuse by mentors of CIS and whether or not that is warranted, I do not know. I hope the School Board will look into this before granting anyone funds or turn over our children to them. Thank you for listening.

Board Member Barrett said I'm on the CIS Board and I've never been compensated at all for being on that Board. That is incorrect.

Ms. Sarah Fowler said I'm bringing greetings from the Friends of Northwest Jacksonville Schools. On July 10, 2012, representatives of the Friends attended a meeting at City Hall with Florida's Commissioner of Education, Gerard Robinson. Commissioner Robinson informed us several alarming things concerning the priority schools. He stated that there were two schools that have the potential of either closing or becoming contracted to an EMO. He also pointed out that the district has already submitted a plan to the state regarding the future of the priority schools. Additionally, Commissioner Robinson stated that the final decision regarding the future of priority schools rests with our local School Board. Last summer, the initial four priority schools were given conditional waivers by the Florida Board of Education. Please advise us of the status of the following four schools and provide a copy of the plan the district submitted to the state for these schools for the 2012-2013 school year. The schools are Ribault High, Raines High, Andrew Jackson High and North Shore Elementary. We are requesting receipt of this information by Thursday, July 26 at noon. Thank you in advance for your timely response to this request. Also, with the recent release of school grades for elementary and middle schools and in recognition of the hard work performed at one of the top priority schools, North Shore Elementary in earning a "B" grade this year. We will present this plaque to the North Shore Chargers and thank the faculty, students, teachers, parents and community for their part in keeping our school system here in Duval County in tact. This is the plaque from the Friends of Northwest Jacksonville Schools.

# Minutes:

I was, also, at the meeting with the Commissioner and I was a little surprised at the way he described some of the issues with our Intervene schools because he said it would be up to our Board to decide whether to close those schools and that's been the last thing on our Board's mind. We know that North Shore Elementary based on their school grade is going to exit Intervene status and we're confident that Ribault High will also exit but those grades won't come out until November or December. At the March State Board Meeting, the report from the support staff from the DOE, only recommended that we continue in our current plan with Andrew Jackson High School which we will, along with a number of additional resources in the social/emotional behavioral arena. I'm not proposing nor have I heard a single Board member mention closing these schools. We are on our way to successfully improving these schools and I thinks it's a great track record of success that we plan on building on and making even higher this coming year. I do appreciate your bringing it up because there may have been some confusion based on some comments. Thank you for doing that.

We received good news Friday night that we were the only school district in the entire state that increased the number of "A's" and decreased the number of "F's". Now, we have gone from one higher "A" to nine higher "A's" than we had in the prior year and three fewer "F's". This makes for the stronger success we have given what we expected with the much more rigorous cut scores, particularly in elementary and middle school. So, kudos to our teachers, principals, support staff for the hard work they did and we still have a long way to go. I feel this is greatly encouraging to some of our schools as there's nothing like progress and success to energize people. They are very excited going into this next school year. We'll make particular attention to those schools to make sure that they turn around and become successful, as well. Highlands Elementary has made incredible gains from an "F" to an "A" - a very special congratulations to their staff! Thank you.

# BUDGET:

Each year at this time of year, the Board approves an advertisement that will be placed in this Saturday's Florida Times-Union and this is outlining by state statute what is required in terms of notification on our budget for next year. On Tuesday, July 31, the Board approves the tentative budget and in September, a final budget.

Over the last four years, we have reduced from anticipated costs \$96.2 million dollars. The state has provided districts with an increase in revenue each year equal to \$19 million for Duval County. That's the good news. The bad news is that it doesn't even recoup the prior year's cut much less going back to where we were in 2006-2007, but we will take it. The required state millage has increased slightly - Required Local Effort - which the state mandates for all school districts and it has increased by .047 mills to 7.6 mills and because property values have decreased even more, it means for the average property owner, an approximate 4% reduction in taxes. Overall, if you count all funds - funds, etc. - all sources, the district's budget will go down by \$64 million from \$1.7 billion to \$1.641.

We have put in place a number of practices that have reduced costs as I mentioned earlier and the Board has been able to focus on some of our priorities including, unlike many districts, maintaining art, music, physical education and media. The Board also increased the number of guidance counselors per school. Now, each school has a full counselor which was not the case for some of our smaller schools in the past. Through some modifications and changes to our athletic program, we're able to maintain it without having to go to the community and our ROTC programs due to a great recruitment effort in those schools. All of this is good news and we've had great cooperation from our Employee Organization in terms of our health insurance, as well. We've been able to maintain a non-contributory health plan for employees with no increase in premiums for dependents and that's been a great collaboration.

Overall given the kind of results we've seen this year compared to what we anticipated, the public is getting a strong bang for the buck and we're getting better on resources and I commend the Board for focusing and working collaboratively with staff to get these good results compared to the last four years. Today was the deadline for applications for the Superintendent Search. Thank you to the community who came out to the meetings and to the teachers and staff who participated; we really do value your opinion and it will be reflected in our decision making for the next Superintendent.

Ms. Wright said I'd like to say "hello" to everybody. I'd like to say to the students in summer school and it ends on Friday and for them to enjoy their last month of summer. I'd like you to join me at 12:01 a.m. as I get on the website to see who has applied to be our next Superintendent as this is an opportunity for us to continue the great work that all of our teachers, our staffs, our students, parents and community stakeholders have come together to help us to move this district forward as we're looking toward some great results. I'd like to thank all the participants in the four community meetings. We heard alot of good information and received many good suggestions. We're going to implement as many of those suggestions and ideas that you shared with us as possible. This is truly a community effort. We've gathered the information from each of you and find the best Superintendent for Duval County Public

Schools. Thank you.

Mr. Hazouri offered our condolences to all those in Aurora, Colorado for their loss. It's a tremendous loss in this country and for all of those in that theatre and those still injured in the hospital. Our prayers are with all of you and it's been a very sad weekend for everyone in America. Hopefully, we'll get stronger, as a result. Election Day is August 14 so we have one more meeting on August 7. The election is important for this School Board. Public education is what this country's foundation was based on - please get out and vote.

Ms. Barrett said I, too, appreciate the community meetings that we had. We received good feedback from teachers and parents. I'm on the Communities in Schools Board and I'd like to invite the young student who attended a Board meeting a couple of months ago - to see the wonderful things CIS are doing. I wish everyone a great summer and I'm looking forward to school starting on August 20th.

Mr. Gentry commended the Superintendent for the incredible progress we have made this past year where Duval County led the state in the number of schools who moved up to an "A" and the number that moved from an "F". That news was made better this last weekend when we learned we had 19 more schools who earned a letter grade better than what the state had given them. So, this has been an exceptional year for our school district in terms of demonstrating high performance and improvement. We've been chasing the state for a long time and people tend to forget where we were ten years ago. We have made huge strides over the last 5-7 years. I know we're all frustrated and want ot beat the state average and move ahead and become the number one urban district and this is the first time I think we've ever led the state. This is a great compliment to the Superintendent and he should be commended for his work and principals, teachers and staff that made that possible. The most recent news is the lack of credibility of a system that is so dependent upon a testing mechanism. We're not only now holding schools and students hostage over these grades, but we're holding teachers and principals. The accountability system is built around these grades which has been shown to be flawed over and over, again. Before FCAT 2.0, we knew the FCAT system was not working as it was giving false positives and negative results for children who could read in high school. The writing exam showed how ridiculous the system had been where our students were not encouraged to use good grammar or spelling but simply sit down. A template is set by the state and then they change the rules and everyone fails the test. It is a very flawed system and I think it's wonderful that they've acknowledged their mistake and came forward and recognized there were hundreds of schools that did better than they said, at first. The system needs to be revamped. We must have assessments but not the way we're doing it. Congratulations to you, Mr. Superintendent and to the Board, too. We do have an important election coming up and I've seen some of the literature. The reality is a decade ago, this School Board was dysfunctional, not respected and not doing well and neither was the district. The Board members that come on made a huge effort to improve the professionalism of this Board which is a Governance Board. The achievement we're seeing in this district is directly attributable to having a strong Board and a good, strong Superintendent/Board team which takes a lot of work. During this time, we've increased our graduation rate over 20%+. So, great accomplishments and we've seen great results under your leadership.

Mr. Lee said I want to echo what my fellow Board members said to the Superintendent, staff, teachers and administrators - job well done with the grades. I know more times than not, you do so much each and every day that goes unnoticed and it is appreciated. The children do respond and are appreciated. Thank you to my fellow Board members for letting me chair, today. Madam Chair Betty Burney will be back in this seat the next go round and I wish her a safe trip back.
