Chairperson's Report

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

Minutes:

During the process of selecting the Duval County Teacher of the Year, something came to my mind. It provided me a remarkable opportunity to view the strength, courage, and love that is required of each of the 8,284 teachers in the 173 public schools which had a teacher of the year. It begs the question "Do words matter?" The answer was made clear on February 24, 2017, at the 26th Annual EDDY Awards, for it was during this event of joy and unity that students in the classes of the five finalists – through their words – showed that indeed, words not only matter, but they have power.

Yes, words matter because words have power. Every student's spoken words from the hearts and mouths of their teachers mattered to them. Words uplifted their spirits, encouraged their dreams, and demonstrated love for their well-being -- academically, socially, and emotionally.

Teachers demonstrate strength each and every day to ensure that their students - our children - understand the power of education for the

betterment of their future and our community. Teachers encourage their students to not just give their best, but give beyond their best, to fulfill their dreams of becoming firefighters, paralegals, merchant seamen, dentists, and even President of the United States. Teachers see the whole child -- love the whole child -- and work daily to help improve and uplift every child academically, emotionally, and socially.

John Rohn said, "Words do two major things: They provide food for the mind and create light for understanding and awareness." Teachers feed the minds, hearts, and spirits of our students so they understand their inner strength to leapfrog into being prepared, productive, and civic-minded citizens. I thank each one of the 8,284 teachers who work hard every day to insure that education in excellence is measured for each one of our students.

It is your words, teachers, that have helped Duval County to have thirty-one 2017 National Merit Scholar Finalists that you saw tonight. It is the words of teachers who have helped the 84% of our graduates to become college ready in reading; 798 certificates earned in the career and technical education since 2012. It is your words, teachers, your commitment, dedication, tolerance, entertaining, and comforting words that have become power in the lives of our students in every school, in every classroom, for every student, every day. So we not only salute Latrece Brown for the 2017 Florida Blue Teacher of the Year, we take this opportunity to salute each and every one of our 8,284 teachers.

Dr. Nikolai Vitti, Superintendent Duval County Public Schools

Before presenting the legislative update, Dr. Vitti briefed everyone on the gifted program changes that were recently made and explained how it affects the elementary level. The program had not been updated in 15 years. There was concern over lack of consistency with the hub model. The self-contained model was piloted this year at the third, fourth, and fifth grade levels. Meetings for parents to attend for feedback will be held regionally along with an explanation of the rationale for the model and the pros and cons that go with it. All input will be considered before finalizing a plan that will go before the Board before the current school year ends.

Dr. Vitti, through a PowerPoint presentation, gave an update on the educational legislative activity occurring at our State level (see attached).

Elizabeth Myers, The New Teacher Project (TNTP)

Ms. Myers is back to follow up on reports she gave in November and December. She explained that the goal of TNTP is to partner with districts to work with rigorous academics, talented people and supportive environments to improve student achievement. TNTP partners with three hybrid schools.

Strategies being used to achieve a grade of "C" or higher are Professional Development, sharing instructional practice to resolve problems through monthly classroom visits, and follow through on next steps--what's working and what's not, what are school-based structures we can use to support teacher improvement. She then explained observations they've seen among the students that shows how Professional Development has contributed to academic gains.

Once again, it has been a busy month for the PTA as we have re-chartered Lee High School's PTA and we'll be re-chartering Jefferson Davis Middle School next week. At our General Membership meeting last Tuesday, State Senator Aaron Bean and State Representative Tracie Davis spoke to us about public education in the upcoming legislative session.

Tomorrow we will be taking over 40 high school students who have completed the Student Leadership Academy to Tallahassee to meet with the Duval Delegation. We have appointments with everyone. That means Senator Bean, Senator Gibson, Representatives Byrd, Daniels, Davis, Fant, Fischer, and Yarborough. The students will participate in a mock session in the Senate Chambers, visit the Governor's Mansion, and have lunch at Andrew's. The students will be speaking with the Duval Delegation regarding public education and they have decided to focus on the amount of testing, currently required by the State, and the concealed carry of guns on school grounds. The students feel strongly about both of these issues.

In addition, the Council has participated in principal interviews with Ms. Wright and other members of the administration. We have sent high school PTAs and guidance counselors their scholarship forms and are

encouraging all graduating seniors to apply for the five scholarships the Council awards every spring. We are putting the finishing touches on the PTA Presidents and Principals Luncheon on May 16 at UNF. This event is attended by over 600 parent volunteers and school staff and is the highlight of our school year. We hope to see you all there in May.

Board Member Grymes thanked Principal Green for hosting the Discover Duval Tour at Fort Caroline Middle School. Any parents interested in enrolling their students at the school can still call the School Choice office.

Vice-Chairman Ashley Smith Juarez

Vice-Chairman Smith Juarez thanked the Florida Bar and The American Board of Trial Advocates for their partnership in educating our teachers in Civics. Congratulations to the Douglas Anderson School of Arts in the Extravaganza event for the performance they gave. She reminded everyone of the Arts Show scheduled for March 16 as well as thanking the Teacher of the Year, Latrece Brown, for her dedication to our students.

Board Member Scott Shine

Board Member Shine gave his best to Board Member Warren Jones who is at home feeling under the weather. He also gave condolences to the family of the student from Mayport Middle who was struck by a car. He noted that Jacksonville is the 6th most dangerous city in America for having dangerous roads. It is a failure to invest in road safety. He thinks the Board should work to improve the situation and would like the Board to have a discussion about changing school hours so children are not walking to school and/or bus stops in the dark.

Board Member Becki Couch

Board Member Couch congratulated Ms. Latrece Brown for being selected

as Teacher of the Year. She, too, enjoyed the Extravaganza performance by the students at Douglas Anderson School of the Arts. She attended the Science Night at Chaffee Trail Elementary and was impressed with how it was organized with all the different booths and the continuity between the elementary and middle school programming. She has two Duval Tours remaining for the public to attend--one at Carter G. Woodson Elementary and one at Enterprise Learning Academy. She thanked Don Nelson and Andy Eckert, P.E., Executive Director, Facilities Design and Construction Services, for taking the time to meet with her and the City to try to improve safety at Enterprise Learning Academy. Even though the meeting didn't yield much resolution, she thanked Council Member Doyle Carter for setting up the meeting. While the District always tries to do what it can to ensure a safe environment for students, she encouraged City Council to work with them to do whatever they can to increase safety for our children.

Board Member Couch also informed the public that The Constitutional Revision Commission has their 37 members appointed; only one is from northeast Florida, so our area has very little representation. The majority of representation is from Orlando south. The opportunity only comes around once every 20 years. It is one of five ways the Florida State Constitution can be amended. They are to gather input around the state although she has doubts they will gather much from northeast FL since this area has very little representation. She also reminded parents of the FSA testing getting ready to launch.

Chairman Wright also offered her condolences to the family of the student from Mayport Middle who was killed in traffic. She thanked the faithbased partners who held the Valentine's Day breakfast who tutor, help furnish supplies, and offer a word of hope to our students. She expressed

appreciation to Board Member Shine, Ms. Karen Chastain, and Michelle Begley, Internal Board Auditor, for their work in helping to put together the Legal plan. She thanked Board Member Hershey for hosting the school visit they did to Bartram Springs Elementary.

Chairman Wright commented on the high volume of people who stood in line at the laptop sale. It speaks to how important parents understand the role technology plays in the education of our children. She also mentioned the re-enactment of Lift Every Voice and Sing which involved the LaVilla Chorus, James Weldon Johnson, Stanton College Preparatory School, and the Young Men's Leadership Academy. State Senator Tony Hill and former Board Member Constance Hall worked together to organize it. She was also excited to inform the public that Northwestern Middle School will become a Computer/Science Academy.
