Minutes:

Duval County and the other 66 school districts have been given a crippling blow to public education with the Florida Legislature's \$419 million, 278-page K-12 public schools bill. It was created behind closed doors by two legislators, which other lawmakers cannot change. They'll have had only about 72 hours to review the bill when they vote earlier today.

In Florida, schools are funded on a per-student basis through a formula called the Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP). The FEFP is comprised of the Base Student Allocation (BSA) and pots of money called categoricals which are reserved for specific purposes such as Transportation, Instructional Materials, ESE Guaranteed Allocation (services for disabled students) and Safe Schools (funding for school resource officers).

Any increases in funding in categoricals cannot be used for general operating expenses or to increase teacher pay. This year's budget cuts the Base Student Allocation (BSA) \$27.07 statewide and in a fiscal year where the state has a budget surplus, we cannot support a budget that cuts the BSA for the first time since the great recession which was officially over in 2009. (Officially over in 2009, the Great Recession is now generally acknowledged to be the most devastating global economic crisis since the Great Depression. As a result of the crisis, the United States lost more than 7.5 million jobs, and the unemployment rate doubled—peaking at more than 10 percent).

The BSA are the only flexible dollars school districts can access. They are used to fund teachers' salaries and benefits or to add new programs for students. If there are fewer dollars, then programs for students must be eliminated and/or decreased.

We are dependent on funding and support from the legislature to ensure that we can continue the level of service we provide and you expect. This Board and Superintendent began the Strategic Abandonment process for the first time which afforded the Superintendent the opportunity to numerically rate each of our programs as we prepared for the upcoming budget. This required that we--the Board--then prioritize programs based on the effectiveness in order to determine how to focus our dollars most effectively on increasing the academic progress of our students. Although we have engaged in this process and will continue tomorrow morning at 9:00 a.m. with another budget workshop--we must prioritize cuts for greater than we imagined. Thus, I urge you to make your voice heard by

contacting our legislators by calling, texting, emailing, and tweeting and let them know this budget is not acceptable and that it negatively impacts your children. More importantly, we must take our voice directly to Governor Rick Scott, and implore that he use his wisdom, vision, and power of the pen to veto this conforming bill 7069.

In 2010, when I was first elected, our District was faced with the closure of four schools in Duval County – William M. Raines, Jean Ribault, Andrew Jackson High Schools and Northshore Elementary School. It was Gov. Rick Scott who, despite the vote of both the local board and the State Board of Commissioners to close the four schools, stood with our community and overrode the closures and every one of those schools are doing well today. Gov. Scott has demonstrated that when we speak in a unified voice and with a clear message as advocates for our children, he listens. Your voice is your strength – let's work as a team to ensure that once again that Gov. Scott can hear our voice to increase funding to educate our children. Gov. Scott's budget acknowledges the need to increase the education budget above the level that the House and Senate were willing to entertain. We thank you for your commitment to educating our students.

Mom--how strong is your voice? Teachers, advocates, administrators, partners, and contractors--how strong is your voice? If Gov. Scott can't hear your call for a veto of HB 7069, then it's not loud enough. Raise the volume. Your voice is your strength and we need all persons and organizations to stand with the Board so we can work together for our students. The Board cannot spend dollars that we do not receive from our legislature.

Chairman Wright then read the Proclamation for Mental Health Awareness Month (see attached).

Ms. Arlene Wolfson

Ms. Wolfson explained to the Board that one of our schools played a role in a little known piece of African-American history through a Rosenwald school that was built here in Jacksonville in the early 1900's. Julius Rosenwald, along with Booker T. Washington, created schools that would further the education of African-American students. Through our real estate department records, Ms. Wolfson was able to determine that West Jacksonville Elementary was the Rosenwald school that was built in Duval County. The two remaining frame structures were later located to what is now the campus of Susie B. Tolbert Elementary School. Ms. Wolfson is hopeful the Board can recognize the Rosenwald school in some way and help convey the concept of unity to our students through this historical account.

Ms. Hill thanked DCPS and the Board for their support of Achievers for Life. She recounted the successes they have experienced with middle school students through the initiative.

During public comment, Chairman Wright announced that the Florida House passed HB 7069. The only protection for school districts from the bill at this point is for the governor to veto it.

Chairman Wright called for a break at 8:14 p.m. The meeting resumed at 8:28 p.m.

After the break, Chairman Wright noted that many of the speaker cards appeared to be filled out by the same person/pen and asked that everyone adhere to the honor system by not approaching the microphone if they were not here by 6:20 p.m. or did not fill out their own speaker card.

Eunice Barnham

Ms. Barnham asked the Board if it matters what type of teacher teaches our children. The focus should be on the children's progress.

The following parents voiced their frustration over students at Stockton Elementary not having any continuity in a gifted program when moving onto middle school. While the argument is made by the District that Stockton is a dedicated STEM magnet, the school does not get any kind of STEM funding. The school lacks a PITSCO lab and other resources that would truly make it a dedicated STEM magnet. They propose that all gifted children be given priority status in the lottery process. The proposal would not cost the District money.

Amanda Lochrie Katie Dearing

Mark Owens, Youth Marketing Director, American Heart Association

Mr. Owens thanked the Board, Dr. Vitti and the Wellness Department for their hard work and support to make Hands Only CPR training a graduation requirement.

Tim Miller, Parent

Mr. Miller noted to the Board that in a time such as this when budgets are very tight, the District may end up spending \$65,000 plus benefits for each athletic trainer on staff. Meanwhile, there never seems to be enough money to hire ESE teachers. While athletic trainers are important in the safety of our sports program, it is all extracurricular and not part of the core function of the District.

Darlene Miller, Parent

Ms. Miller explained some of the issues they have had to deal with pertaining to school activity with their ESE student and the frustration that comes along with it.

Dr. Angela Mann, Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychology, University of North Florida

Dr. Mann thanked the Board for the Mental Health Proclamation read earlier in the evening. She discussed some of the mental health challenges many school psychologists face in schools today.

Chairman Wright noted that as the Board uses the Strategic Abandonment Process while reviewing programs during budget workshops, there has been unhealthy public conversation about one program in particular through an Op-Ed in a local newspaper about the partnership the Duval County School Board has with Teach For America (TFA). It would not be fair to the public if she didn't provide objective facts about the existing program. Chairman Wright shared the following questions and answers regarding TFA:

- 1. We contracted with TFA to bring in 100 teachers for 2016-17. Correct? For clarification, how many first year TFA members were slated to be recruited for 2016-17?
- A: The contract provided that TFA would provide "a minimum of 100 teachers up to 110 teachers".
- 2. How many first year corps members signed contracts with DCPS for 2016-17?

A: 54 Total.

- 3. How many second year corps members signed contracts with DCPS in 2016-17?
- A: There were 78 corps members in the 2015-2017 group. Only 61 returned for the 2016-2017 year (2nd year).
- 4. How many second year corps members are teaching today in DCPS? A: 61
- 5. How many TFA corps members have signed contracts with DCPS in the 10 years of the partnership?
- A: Staff have data identifying corp members from 2008 to current. Since 2008, 644 members have signed contracts with DCPS.
- 6. How many active TFA corps members and alums combined are teaching in DCPS today?
- A: 170 are teaching in the classroom [Chairman Wright read 107].
- 7. How many of the above referenced TFA corps members and alums are currently teaching in charter schools?
- A: According to TFA, there are 21 former corps members in charter schools and nine worked in the district as corps members as first and second years.
- 8. What is the sum total of funds that we have paid to TFA for their contracts over 10 years?

A: \$4,493,410.95

9. What was the price to DCPS per corps member per year for the three year contract that expires June 1?

A: The annual contract is up to \$600,000 per year. This covers up to 200 corp members (1st year and 2nd year) for a per corp member cost of \$3,000 per year. This amount is subject to equitable prorations based on the actual number of corp members provided and the length of time served by the corp member.

10. What is the proposed price to DCPS per corps member per year for the next contract term?

A: TFA projected 50 corp members for the 17-18 school year. Based on this, the contract would cover 100 corp members (1st and 2nd year) for a per corp member cost of \$4,000 per year. This amount would be subject to equitable prorations based on the actual number of crop members provided and the length of time served by the corp member.

11. How many teachers (TFA or not) did DCPS hire in 2014-15, 2015-16, 2016-17?

A: The number of teachers hired are as follows:

At our April meeting we had a bit of fun creating our vision video that would be used for the beginning of the summit. We split up into small groups and were able to develop the following clip:

[Ms. Wynn showed a video that explained who the JAGS are and what their vision is to improve education for DCPS students.

Following our April meeting, the heat was really on because the summit was right around the corner. Many members pulled together for countless hours to ensure that this event was designed and run by students. We really experienced what it was like to put on a large scale event from planning to the full scale implementation.

On April 20th the event that we had all been waiting for was finally here. We started off the day by working with our advisors to ensure setup of the facility. The backdrop, room layout, banners, and programs were all designed by our logistics team – Brittany Cavin from Duval Virtual and Hau Ly from Sandalwood. They really made the event feel professional. Gradually guests began to arrive and we were thrilled to have representation from most high schools across the district. School administrators, faculty, and students all came out to work together and it

was exciting to witness.

Our message was one of the most important aspects of the event: what is student engagement and what are some proven strategies we can bring back to our schools. Darien Glover, the student rep from Duval Virtual, took the entire audience through a journey about how we as students define engagement and the significant impact meaningful student engagement has on achievement. Diamond Boston then highlighted a districtwide view of student engagement opportunities, based off a needs assessment we performed earlier in the year, and the current responsibilities of student governments and councils. I was then able to share with the group the idea of a student engagement framework, strategies schools can adopt to improve student experiences and how we can make student engagement sustainable over time.

Following our presentation, we transitioned to table discussions. It was so powerful to watch the school administrators, faculty, and students dive deep into the conversation about student engagement at their schools. Many schools have re-evaluated their student leadership opportunities and have reached out to our organization for support. Every group felt comfortable enough to share and we were very proud that we could create that safe environment to facilitate those types of conversations.

While the preparation up to the event was exhausting, I am so proud of how it turned out. The group, as well as our advisors, did a wonderful job putting everything together and for that I am most thankful.

We have two meetings remaining until the conclusion of our year. On May 10th we will have the opportunity to give feedback to the district on the student code of conduct. At our final meeting, we will be celebrating and will end how we started; with a BANG. We will have a fun filled afternoon of pizza and bowling. It shall be an afternoon to remember.

Ms. Brady mentioned how impressed she is with the effort underway to defeat HB 7069, which is multifaceted.

Results of the survey they took among employees are in and she would like to bring everyone's attention to the answers to questions 1, 4, 5, 9, and 22 (see attached). Those questions refer to respect and dignity of employees. Question 9 refers to adherence to the bargaining agreement. Fewer than 2 schools gave that 100%. She is dismayed by that. A more detailed review of the results will be done later, but not tonight due to the lateness of the hour.

Also, two grievances were filed back in November and December 2016 based on actions taken regarding one of their members. Office of General Counsel sent out correspondence in March, which received a follow-up by DTU, but there has been no response from the Board since then. She feels if there is no response from the Board, they will have no choice but to resort to arbitration and/or an unfair labor practice.
