Chairperson's Report

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

Minutes:

Ashley Smith Juarez, Chairman Duval County School Board

Tonight, I want to use my report to highlight the partnership between your Duval School Board and your Jacksonville City Council. You have already heard about the exciting One Tree for Every School initiative. We had a productive joint meeting with City Council on September 21. Agenda items included discussion of school utilization, new development and population shifts, concurrency and new construction. We decided to re-energize the Joint Planning Committee to work together to ensure appropriate capacity at schools.

We also discussed hazardous walking conditions and newly enacted state legislation known as Gabby's Law that prioritizes hazardous areas for infrastructure improvements including crosswalks, sidewalks and roadways.

Charter school development standards were discussed as well. The City's planning department is working on development and implementation of standards that will apply to new charter sites to assist with safety and traffic flow.

Finally, we discussed district and city services for students who are homeless or in transition. DCPS provides services according to the McKenny-Vento [Act]. Future discussions will include seeking to better coordinate community services and incorporating schools in neighborhood revitalization efforts.

Another exciting partnership between the City and the School Board was also announced this month: the dedication of Landon Park. Councilwoman Lori Boyer and I have worked together to combine city funds and DCPS design and operations services to improve the drainage at the field and track at Landon Middle School. Both the City and District will be able to use the field under a joint land use agreement.

Thank you to Council President Boyer for her leadership; operations staff, city staff, contractors and school staff for seeing this project to fruition.

There was also much talk this month about our desire to work together, set high expectations for students and continue successful work like that described above. More will be discussed on the proposed mediation later in the meeting.

During our September 14th meeting, we reflected on the presentation given by Ms. Betty Burney. During that presentation, she emphatically encouraged the need for leaders to self-reflect. This year we are using the five practices of the Student Leadership Challenge to guide our leadership growth. We spent time during our meeting analyzing the results of our self-assessment and creating goals for the year for selfimprovement. We also held speeches and elections for the 2016-2017 officers of the Executive Board. The new officers are as follows:

During our September 28th meeting, we arrived with the room setup like a board room. Each Executive Officer was responsible for providing an officers report. My role was to teach and model parliamentarian procedures for the group. I was most impressed with how quickly the group was able to understand the procedures and put them into practice. Our Vice-President, Gerrold [Williams], was responsible for holding our members accountable to attend meetings. We then heard from our treasurer, Nia [Parker], who reported on our budget and current unexpended funds. Our Public Relations Officer, Maria [Dawson], provided a Social Media strategy to enhance our organization's name recognition amongst our peers.

After the presentations of my fellow officers were complete, we had a guest speaker, Catherine Bekkedal, Supervisor of School Counseling, speak with us about the new enrollment dates and procedures for the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, also known as the FAFSA. The FAFSA application is now available to fill out. Its availability comes a whole three months earlier and just got a whole lot easier, such as the tax retriever tool that retrieves your tax information and your parents' tax information from the IRS database. There are also many myths about Financial Aid, such as "my parents make too much money" or "I don't have good enough grades" but those are all myths and students can still gualify for grants, scholarships, and loans. In addition to the FAFSA, the State of Florida Financial Application is also available. This application allows students to be evaluated for 12 grants and scholarships, one of which is the Bright Futures merit-based scholarship. There is currently \$180 billion available in federal college aid and we highly encourage ALL seniors to go ahead and fill out the FAFSA and State of Florida Financial Application now!

After Ms. Bekkadal's presentation, we used parliamentarian procedures to guide our discussion on the amendment process to our organizational bylaws. One key discussion point was building sustainability within the organization by providing our junior representatives with a guaranteed position within the organization during their senior year. While we believe that building sustainability is important, we also do not want to remove the school's say in the nomination process. Therefore, after long deliberation, we came to the conclusion, as a group, that it would be best to encourage schools to have their junior representatives be senior representatives in the following school year. We tabled other items for discussion until our next meeting which will be held on October 12th, here in the School Board Building, at 3:30 pm in Room 307. Our meetings are open and all students are welcome to attend. I would also like to extend a thank you to the Board, Chairwoman, and Superintendent for providing the J.A.G.S. with this remarkable opportunity and platform to speak on.

Minutes:

After asking Dr. Vitti to clarify for the public what the Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan is for the public, Vice-Chairman Wright asked for the amount of money planned for boundaries during the 2015-2016 school year and for the 2016-2017 school year. Ms. Latrell Edwards, Chief Financial Officer, estimated between \$4-5 million was set aside for boundary changes in 2015-2016 and would have rolled over into 2016-2017 if work is still being done.

Board Member Couch asked if the roll over money for boundaries would have been included in the budget advertisement published for the public. Ms. Edwards explained it would have been part of a list advertising it at a higher level. Dr. Vitti clarified for Board Member Couch that the money rolled over into the budget from last year was not allocated to last year's boundary changes. He also explained that this year, the U.S. Department of Education is awarding magnet grants in two separate cycles. The District did not receive any grant money during the first cycle but will submit an application for the second cycle to be awarded around December 2016 or January 2017. The grants would be supplemental in nature.

Board Member Hall asked if the District is using the cloud as storage for data. Dr. Vitti said that is the direction in which the District is moving and student records would be part of that.

Chairman Smith Juarez asked if there is any anticipation of needing to use 2016-2017 school year capital to fund school boundary changes that were approved in the 2015-2016 school year. Dr. Vitti confirmed there are no plans to allot money in that way. Chairman Smith Juarez was concerned about expenses for Andrew Jackson High School and A. Phillip Randolph High School that appeared to be incongruent upon review. Some of the expenditures on contracts appear to exceed what was approved by the Board in the agenda item. Since she was not able to review the numbers until late that afternoon with the Board's Internal Auditor, she prefers to delay approval of the Five-Year Capital Plan until Dr. Vitti and staff have an opportunity to review the same documents she is reviewing and answer her questions. She is concerned that contracts may have been awarded or expenditures may have been made without Board approval and would like clarification in case an

amendment is needed before moving forward.
